His research interests include the health impacts of environmental change and biodiversity loss and the epidemiology and prevention of heat-related illness and death. He has experience with innovative methodologies such as use of remote sensing to modeling vulnerability to heat stress in urban environments and use of participatory research in climate change adaptation planning. Dr. Luber is involved in several national level advisory bodies on climate change research and a lead author for the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), Fifth Assessment Report.
